



About The University of North Carolina at Greensboro

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro was chartered in 1891 as one of the three original institutions comprising The University of North Carolina System. It grew in academic strength to become a highly regarded liberal arts and graduate institution that offers superb professional preparation for specialized careers. Today, UNCG has over 16,000 students, approximately one-fourth of whom are graduate students, and over 900 full-time faculty members. The University offers baccalaureate degrees in more than 100 areas of study, 63 master's degrees, and 23 doctoral degrees. Classified as a Doctoral/Research Intensive University, UNCG has been ranked among the "2008 Great Colleges to Work For" by the *Chronicle of Higher Education* and was honored at the 2008 National Role Models Conference for its commitment to advancing diversity.

Faculty benefit from an extensive library, numerous training opportunities in teaching technology, support services for grant writing, several interdisciplinary research centers, progressive administrative leadership and a shared governance system. Special training opportunities (e.g., teaching, grant-writing) and funding (e.g., new faculty research awards) are readily available in support of new faculty.

Location

Greensboro, traditionally warm and hospitable, enjoys a national reputation as a fine place to live. Located in the Piedmont Triad, just four hours driving from the ocean and two hours from the mountains, with its sister cities Winston-Salem and High Point, it affords the amenities of a medium-sized city that is rich in cultural resources. The University of North Carolina at Greensboro is proud to play a central role in these activities.

About the Department

The counselor education program and its faculty have achieved national recognitions for program excellence as well as faculty scholarship, professional leadership, and student mentoring. Faculty and students have access to professional counseling organizations (NBCC and Chi Sigma Iota) located in Greensboro. The program has a long and successful record of mentoring new faculty through collaborative and supportive relationships.

The counseling program is based in a scientist problem-solver training approach with a strong emphasis on understanding the normal developmental themes throughout a person's life, as well as ways persons may respond to developmental challenges and seek to cope with life change and transitions. Throughout the program, students apply theoretical knowledge with practicum clients in a state-of-the-art on-campus Clinic. The Clinic supports the training and research mission of the program with attractive facilities that feature digital recording and phone-in systems, one-way mirrors and a large observation deck that can accommodate an entire class, and 16 clinical rooms equipped for individual, couple, family, and group counseling, as well as a play therapy room.

Master's degrees are offered in school counseling, clinical/mental health counseling, couple and family counseling, and college counseling/student development in higher education. Doctoral students have extensive supervised experiences in classroom teaching, clinical supervision, and the research process. The program attracts diverse student cohorts from across the nation and internationally. Our graduates are in clinical service, leadership, and faculty positions from coast to coast.
