## **Session 1: Innovations in Psychopharmacology**

This session is divided into three components: psychotropic medications and their use in treating the major psychiatric disorders; new psychotropics and psychopharmacology research, including the latest delivery methods; complementary and alternative therapies. The largest portion of the session is dedicated to contemporary psychotropic medications and their use in treating the major disease states. Mental health disorders to be covered will include: depressive disorders, bipolar disorders, thought disorders/schizophrenia, anxiety disorders, attention and memory disorders, sleep problems, and chemical dependency.

**Presenter:** Brent Joye, MD is a Board-Certified psychiatrist working in the Counseling and Testing Center at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Dr. Joye graduated from the Wake Forest University School of Medicine where he also did his psychiatry residency training. Dr. Joye has been in private practice for seven years. He has also worked in public mental health at The Guilford Center and DAYMARK Recovery Services working in emergency services and PACT, in addition to his usual clinical duties. Dr. Joye is also a national key opinion leader and speaker for Pfizer pharmaceuticals, giving lectures on the treatment of Bipolar Disorder and smoking cessation.

## **2 Concurrent Sessions (Choose One):**

### **Psychiatric Medication and Ethics**

In this session, participants will explore the myriad of ethical issues surrounding psychiatric medication from a helping perspective. The important issues of informed consent, practicing within one's professional mandate, and self-determination/beneficence will be examined as they relate to working with clients who may need medication. Case examples will be utilized to inform discussion. Important legal precedents and policy trends will also be presented.

**Presenter:** Dr. Melissa Floyd is an Associate Professor at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro in the Department of Social Work. Dr. Floyd is the Undergraduate Social Work Director. She has worked in mental health practice for many years with persons who have serious mental illness. Recent research projects include exploring creative alternatives to involuntary treatment, studying people with mental illness in the jails of North Carolina and program evaluations in social service agencies. Dr. Floyd has been a Licensed Clinical Social Worker for over 12 years.

### **Cultural Considerations in the Context of Ethical Pharmacological Treatment Planning**

This session is designed to help clinicians address cultural considerations when planning treatment for patients whose symptoms may warrant the use of pharmacologic treatment. We will address biological and cultural variables that may influence patients' attitudes toward treatment and discuss how clinicians can incorporate the understanding of these in collaborative treatment planning. Finally, culturally-appropriate clinician skills in collaborative, comprehensive treatment planning will be addressed. During parts of this breakout session, case vignettes will be used, in addition to interactive learning methods and active participation.

**Presenter:** Ayesha Chaudhary is a senior staff psychiatrist at Duke University Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS), a clinic designed to provide psychiatric and mental health care to university students. With over a decade of experience, she maintains a busy caseload, and provides clinical, crisis intervention, and administrative consultation. Along with her clinical practice, Ayesha is active in teaching and clinical research. She is on faculty at the Duke University Medical Center, where she teaches psychiatry residents and medical students. Some of her recent clinical research on multicultural variables in pharmacologic treatment was presented at the American Psychiatric Association annual meeting in 2008. She supervises psychology and social work trainees, and teaches course curriculum seminars. Ayesha is a recipient of the Glaxo-Wellcome Clinical Psychopharmacology award, and the Pfizer resident reporter award. She has conducted educational seminars for professional and community audiences, and will be teaching at the American Psychiatric Association conference in 2010.
