Session 1: Assessing & Responding to Suicide Risk: A Clinician's Guide

Mental health professionals are a critical first line of defense for suicide prevention and intervention. Unfortunately, most professions feel uncertain and anxious during the times clients need us most present, calm, and focused. During this interactive workshop, participants will learn vital skills including how to recognize suicide warning signs, assess suicide risk, and apply suicide standards of within outpatient settings. Participants will have opportunities to practice skills and receive supportive feedback within small group settings.

Presenter: Casey A. Barrio Minton, PhD, NCC, is an Associate Professor and Counseling Program Coordinator for the University of North Texas. She specializes in crisis intervention and evidence-based counselor education and was recognized in *Counseling Today* as "on the cutting edge" in counseling research. Dr. Barrio Minton has authored 16 peer-reviewed journal articles and equally as many chapters and creative works. She is co-author of *The Professional Counselor*, an award-winning book regarding counselor preparation, and co-editor of a *Professional Counseling Excellence through Leadership and Advocacy*, the first text to address leadership and advocacy competencies for counselors. Dr. Barrio Minton serves as President of Chi Sigma Iota (CSI) International and Secretary for the Association for Assessment in Counseling and Education (AACE). She received the American Counseling Association's 2010 Best Practice Award for her research regarding crisis intervention preparation.

"The Nuts and Bolts of Threat Management: What Everyone Needs to Know"

Clinicians receive training on assessing suicidal risk and even managing and providing intervention for suicidal risk. However, assessing harm to others is a less covered topic. Today's presentation will answer the following questions: What is a threat? What is threat management and how does it work in practice? Who should be on a threat assessment team and what training should they receive? Is there a standard of care for threat management and if so, what is it?

Presenter: Peter Romary is an attorney, as well as a Certified Arbitrator and Mediator. He is currently the Director of Student Legal Services and Adjunct Faculty at East Carolina University as well as a partner in the security consulting company QVerity, which was founded and is staffed by former CIA personnel. In practice Romary concentrated in civil and criminal litigation, alternative dispute resolution and risk management. He has also consulted on the designing of personal, corporate and educational safety and risk management plans and has lectured on these topics as well as on threat assessment, detection of deception, interviewing, interrogation, conflict resolution and mediation around the US and overseas. For his work, in 2004 Romary received the Ellis Island Medal of Honor (the highest civilian honor sanctioned by both the US House and the Senate that is awarded solely to US Citizens), and he also received a Knighthood that was "apostolically blessed" by Pope John Paul, II. In 2003 Romary was one of only 52 Men from around the world honored in the Times Square Project for their work combating violence against women. In 2010 the University of North Carolina Association of Student Governments conferred on Romary their highest honor the "John Sanders Award for Student Advocacy". In 2011 Romary received the NC Coalition Against Domestic Violence / Verizon Wireless Men for Change Award.

Suicidal Behavior Among Youths: Risk Factors, Assessment, and Intervention

This presentation will focus on evidence-based practices in working with adolescents.

Presenter: David B. Goldston, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences at Duke University Medical Center. His clinical interests include affective disorders and/or suicidal behavior in children and adolescents, training for parents with young and oppositional children. Dr. Goldston has authored over 50 peer-reviewed journal articles, almost 10 book chapters, and 4 books and technical reports. He is on the editorial boards of *Suicide and Life-Threatening Behavior* and the *Journal of Clinical Child and Adolescent Psychology*, as well as a peer reviewer for numerous publications. Dr. Goldston is also on the Scientific Advisory Council and Research Grants Committee for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. He is the Co-Director of the Psychosocial Treatment Clinic (PTC) at Duke University and clinical supervisor of Duke University graduate students, psychology interns, and child psychiatry fellows rotating through the PTC.
