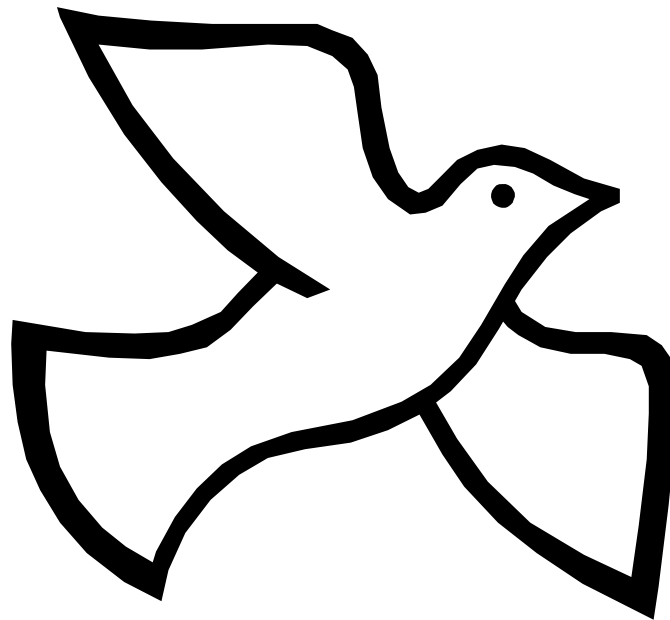


## The White Dove
