Why get this Post-Baccalaureate Certificate?

This 15-credit hour Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT) Certificate program provides the knowledge and skills necessary to use AAT as an intervention to motivate, enhance skills, and promote health and optimal well-being. Currently the demand for quality AAT professionals is far greater than the supply of trained individuals. Our certificate program will provide the training and skills essential for successful application of AAT in a variety of settings: hospitals, long term care, mental health, schools, and others.

Program Description

This certificate introduces the basics of animal assisted therapy, its history, and instrumentation and intervention techniques, including assessment, treatment and evaluation processes. Students will prepare policies and procedures to implement AAT practice. It also includes field experiences in both clinical (AAT approaches for specific disabilities) and non-clinical (classroom) applications of AAT.

It has four components: 1) Weekend intensive Delta Society Pet Partners Course followed by RPM 535: Animal Assisted Therapy online course (3 credits), 3) Advanced Field Experience I (6 credits), 4) two approved supportive courses (e.g. animal psychology, abnormal psychology, special education, nursing course, gerontology or advanced professional practice course related to scope of practice which must be 500-level or above.

Target Audience

This coursework is intended for teachers, nurses, physicians, psychologists, therapists, clinical social workers, counselors, recreational therapists, adaptive physical educators, occupational therapists, physical therapists, and other future health and human service professionals.

Educational Objectives

Students will be able to:

- 1) Demonstrate competence in the roles and responsibilities of animal assisted therapy delivery,
- 2) Create policies and procedures for specific AAT program settings within the scope of professional practice,
- 3) Apply health and human service knowledge and evidence-based practice in a variety of clinical and educational settings (i.e. nursing home, assisted living, hospital, special schools, detention centers, behavioral health, military),
- 4) Examine the complementary approaches based on scientific evidence in the form of AAT protocols.

Admission Requirements

A completed undergraduate degree or permission of program director is needed for admission into the certificate.

Program Requirements

This program requires a weekend AAT intensive followed by 100% online and distance education components. RPM 535 (3), RPM 697 (6), and two related courses (6) fulfill the certification requirements. (15 credits).

Additional Information

The online class is taught on campus via our “Virtual Classroom” allowing students from all over the world access to the “live” course from a desktop computer with internet service. Lab courses do require students to be present to experience hands on learning. To apply contact the UNCG Graduate School (add details)
