At the completion of this course, you will have practiced writing in a variety of genres, developed writing skills applicable to a variety of academic disciplines, and studied language in personal, literary, and academic contexts. You will be able to interpret and evaluate written and oral arguments, construct arguments, and communicate those arguments clearly and effectively. You will also be able to locate and evaluate relevant information, weigh evidence, and evaluate the arguments of differing viewpoints.

Participation Requirements:

It's imperative that students come to class prepared and ready to contribute to the discussion. Thoughtful and active participation accounts for 30% of your final grade. Class participation is not only necessary, and helpful to the other students in the class, it is one of the central ways in which I will be evaluating your understanding of the assigned readings. Class participation means engaging in the class discussion, group work, and in class assignments, in a way that is both thoughtful and respectful to your fellow students.

Course Work:

By the end of the semester each student will have completed a portfolio of revised work (15-20 pages in length) including papers and shorter writing assignments. The portfolio is both a record of the progress you have made and a showcase for your best work. It accounts for 70% of your final grade. It will include a personal narrative (5-6 pages), a text analysis (4-5 pages), a profile essay (4-5 pages), and several shorter pieces of writing. We will discuss the paper writing process extensively in class before you begin working and continue throughout the semester. During the course of the semester I will also meet with each one of you individually in order to discuss drafts, revisions, and writing exercises in detail. I am always available, of course, to discuss revisions, readings, and the craft of writing, during office hours as well.
