Civil War and Reconstruction: Selected Topics

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MW 3:30-4:15

This upper level lecture-seminar examines the American Civil War and Reconstruction in terms of nineteenth century nationalism and state formation. We do this in three ways: the making and unmaking of southern nationalism; the emergence of a Black nation-within-a-nation; and, the triumph of northern wage labor capitalism. The objectives are threefold. First, to encourage students to rethink familiar temporal and spatial categories. Second, to challenge conventional narratives concerning civil war origins, heroic military engagements, and regional reconstruction. Third, to situate the era within comparative and global frameworks of nationalist ideology, slavery and emancipation, and capitalist relations of production.
