Who hasn't heard this little poem? But, is it true? Was King George III really insane? Were the Salem witches really demons? Did Andrew Jackson really have a big block of cheese in the White House? This course will attempt to answer these questions, and present fully the major topics in American History from Colonization to the Civil War. We will focus on diverse subjects including politics, race, gender, economics, and culture, all the while attempting to understand how historical events touched everyday citizens.

For the most part, the course format will be lecture, although I believe in open discussion and differences of opinion. Try to think of History as not solely an impressive recitation of names and dates, but rather a long, interwoven tale of complex social, cultural and political forces.

This section of History 211 is WRITING INTENSIVE. We will complete a total of four short papers and one longer research paper. Please refer to grade breakdown below to clarify this component of the course.

The two term exams will be a combination of short answer and short essay. They will be based on both the lectures and the text readings.
