

# **PSC 260: Introduction to Comparative Politics**

## **Course Overview**

This class provides an introduction to the comparative study of international politics. It begins with an overview of general themes and ideas that are central to the study of government around the world. Following this general introduction, six specific countries are examined in more detail. The class focuses on the issues of democracy and democratization; we will assess differences among established democracies in the industrialized world, and will pay particular attention to the challenges and obstacles to democratization and effective democratic governance in developing countries.

section. They may include material from both the readings and the lectures. Each student's lowest quiz grade will be dropped from the final average.
