Since graduating from Stanford and Princeton, Dr. Levinson has taught at Stanford, Harvard, and at UNCG. He has held a Danforth Graduate Fellowship, a Mellon Faculty Fellowship at Harvard and a Mellon Fellowship at the National Humanities Center. He is the author of numerous reviews, articles, essays, and 3 books: *Science, Metaphysics, and the Chance of Salvation*; *The Religious Investigations of William James*; and *Santayana, Pragmatism, and the Spiritual Life*. Currently, his academic interests have turned to what he and his co-author, Professor Jonathan Malino of Guilford College, call “Festive Jewish Naturalism.” He has recently given the William James Lecture at Harvard Divinity School on “**Festive Jewish Naturalism and the Legends of the Jews**”; and The Malcolm Diamond Memorial Lecture at Princeton on “**Festive Jewish Naturalism and Radical Evil.**”
