'I am really overwhelmed'

Science Building named for Chancellor Sullivan

Since it opened in 2003, the science facility our campus received through the state higher education bonds referendum has simply been called the "Science Building."

That changed last Thursday, when the Board of Trustees unveiled a new name – the Patricia A. Sullivan Science Building.

The announcement took place following the final trustees meeting of Sullivan's tenure as chancellor. Following adjournment, the group came to the site where a crowd was waiting.

"Pat, for your dedication; for the excellence of your leadership; for your love of this campus, its faculty, staff and students; and for your love of the sciences – the UNCG Board of Trustees can't think of a better way to honor you and your legacy, than to name this building for you," said Trustees Chair Stephen C. Hassenfelt.

Amid cheers, Hassenfelt and UNC President Bowles unveiled the new sign, followed by hugs and misty eyes. "Pat said she was going to 'lose it,'" Hassenfelt confided to everyone in attendance as the cheers subsided, before picking up the theme of science, of Sullivan being a biologist. "Pat, you are now a permanent part of the DNA of UNCG."

"Pat has never, ever 'lost it,'" President Bowles humorously and emphatically said, as he praised her and thanked her for her sage advice and friendship over the past years.

Bowles presented Sullivan with The Old North State Award, which recognizes "dedication and service beyond expectation and excellence to the Great State of North Carolina." He read the award certificate signed by Gov. Mike Easley: "You have recognized that the real

focus in life is to do more, to be more and to give more. It is above all else to matter and to count ... to stand for something and to make a difference."

Sullivan appeared humbled by the tributes. "I am really overwhelmed. I stand in gratitude to all of you."

She noted how the "striking, high-tech building" appears at night, the light emanating from it. She spoke of the light of learning, and enumerated many prestigious science events the building has already hosted.

"It's discovery that occurs here. And it's creation that occurs here. Those are the drivers of the 21st century economy. Ideas and innovation and creativity. And that's what happens here every day. That's what is happening all around this campus."

The chancellor looked at those gathered and reflected on "the many things we've worked on together." She spoke of the university's successes made possible by "very talented people committed to a common cause and to making a difference."

"Congratulations to you, and thank you so much."

About Those Bonds

Chancellor Sullivan's efforts campaigning for the passage of the 2000 State Higher Education Bonds referendum was front-and-center in Thursday's naming ceremony.

"No one worked harder to get those bonds passed in the fall of 2000," said Trustees Chair Stephen C. Hassenfelt. "There are stories about Pat in the grocery store on Saturdays, passing out bond brochures while she was doing her shopping."

The science building, which broke ground on March 2001, would become the first project in the UNC system fully funded from that bond campaign. It is the campus' largest and most expensive bond project.

What About Aug. 1?

Chancellor Sullivan told the 250-300 who gathered at the naming announcement that she is focusing on the time between now and July 31:

"It's very hard for me to think about my life after July 31st. Everybody has been asking me what I'm going to do. I tell them 'Right now I have some things I have to accomplish before the end of July, because I don't want to leave any loose ends for my successor.' That is really what I am focused on.

"And quite frankly, I am going to get a good book ... On August first when I wake up, normally before 5, I'll plug in the coffee pot, and I'll start reading a book, and I'll be wondering, 'What's going on, on campus?'"

Those gathered appreciatively applauded.

Sullivan Scholarship Fund

Faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends have been making donations to the Dr. Patricia A. Sullivan and Dr. Charles W. Sullivan Scholarship Fund to enable the chancellor's "Students First" legacy to endure beyond her tenure. 'Boss' Promotes UNCG Project

Springsteen concert will aid Project Green Leaf

Legendary rocker Bruce Springsteen, who performs Monday, April 28, at the Greensboro Coliseum, has tapped UNCG-based Project Green Leaf as one of two local charities to benefit from the traditional "Pass the Bucket" fundraiser conducted at each of his concerts.

Even better, the Springsteen tour is providing Project Green Leaf with two pairs of VIP tickets, which include backstage passes. They are being auctioned on the Charity Folks web site.

The deadline for bidding is 6 p.m. Wednesday, April 23. To place a bid, go to charityfolks.com and click on "Music" under the "By Category" heading. The tickets for PGL are listed, along with two pairs for Greensboro Urban Ministry, the other Greensboro charity Springsteen has selected.

"This is one of the most exciting things that has happened with the project," said Dr. Susan Andreatta (Anthropology), who started Project Green Leaf. "The ticket auction and the 'Pass the Bucket' collection will give us some much-needed support, and just being selected validates this project's efforts.

"I got a call from the Springsteen tour to say that we had been selected for 'Pass the Bucket.' I wondered how they found us."

The answer was simple. Project Green Leaf was listed as a "community connection" on the World Hunger Year web site, which was founded in 1975 and drew support from singer Harry Chapin. The Springsteen tour picked up on it. PGL is the ideal charity Springsteen likes to support – a non-profit organization where people are helping themselves improve their daily lives.

The project's mission is to promote and support a local agro-food system. Project Green Leaf is dedicated to sustaining local agriculture by strengthening community between farmers and consumers, thus providing for better quality of living. By promoting various activities, such as direct marketing and educational/outreach programs, PGL assists in developing the connections necessary for a local agro-food system.

The free event will be held at 7 p.m. in Jarrell Hall of Jackson Library. A reception in the Faculty Center will follow.

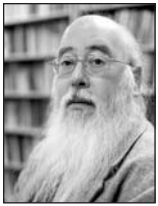
